ALEXANDER BURNETT TO STAND FOR UK ELECTION IN MAY 2015

Since the last banner, there has been some exciting political news in the family.

Alexander Burnett, whom many of you will have met over the years, has been selected to stand in the 2015 UK General Election for the West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine constituency.

He managed to beat off three challengers in what was the second Open Primary to be held in Scotland, held at Victory Hall in Aboyne Aberdeenshire on the March 9th.

Some 200 people turned out to participate in the proceedings. Alan Cochrane, one of Scotland's longest-serving political journalists, interviewed each candidate in turn followed by questions from the floor.

Alexander said: "I am absolutely delighted to have won the selection to be Conservative candidate for Westminster and for West Aberdeenshire and Kincardine. I have been overwhelmed by the support over the last week, and would like to give my thanks and deep appreciation for that.

"My task now is to repay the faith that has been shown in me. I look forward to getting out and about in the constituency over the coming weeks and months, and speaking to as many people as possible."

Some say a week is a long time in politics... they are right. A week later, Alexander was on the podium, addressing the Conservative Party Conference in Edinburgh, opened by UK Prime Minister David Cameron. I am sure I speak for many in congratulating Alexander on his success to date, and wish him all the best over the future months (and possibly years!) Press article on Page 16....



FLOWERS OF THE FOREST

At the instigation of the ambitious young brother of King of the Scots, Henry VIII led an army against Scotland. King James IV and the "flowers" of Scottish nobility were brutally slain at the Battle of Flodden on September 9, 1513, one of the greatest disasters to befall the country.

The pipe tune "Flowers of the Forest" was a soulful lament written shortly after the battle took place. The "forest" refers to a district of Scotland called Ettrick Forest where the battle took place.

Following in this tradition Wilma Burnett Crowe who died shortly before her 99th birthday and William Davis Jones son of Susie and Dave Jones, names will be entered into the roll, of the Flowers of the Forest at the Loch Norman Scottish Games during the Kirking of the Tartan Ceremony on Sunday APRIL 13, 2014.

ROBERT THE BRUCE

March 27th is the 707th Anniversary of the Coronation of Robert the Bruce

After Balliol's abdication in 1296 Scotland was without a monarch for 10 years and ruled remotely bv King Edward I of England. Scots national resistance developed into a war of independence in which William Wallace and then Robert Bruce played a leading role. Wallace won a

victory over the English at Stirling Bridge in 1297 and proclaimed himself Guardian of Scotland. The following year Ed-ward invaded Scotland again and defeated William Wallace at Falkirk. Wallace

went underground but was captured and in 1305, tried and hung in London. In 1298 Robert Bruce took over the title of Guardian of Scotland and, having killed his rival John Comyn, claimed the throne as the great-great grandson of David I and in 1306 had himself crowned king at Scone as Robert I. Independence was made easier by the death of

Edward I as he set out to claim back Scotland. Bruce set about removing the English from Scotland and by early 1314 Stirling was the only castle in English hands. An English army sent to break the siege was routed by Bruce's smaller Scottish force at Bannockburn in June 1314.

Six year later in 1320 Bruce and the Scottish nobles issued the Declaration of Arbroath asserting Scottish Independence :'For as longs as one hundred of us shall remain alive we shall never in any wise consent to submit to the rule of the English, for it is not for glory that we fight ... but for freedom alone.'

However, a truce with Edward II of England failed to stop hostilities which continued until Edward II was deposed in 1327.

The Treaty of Edinburgh between Robert I and Edward III in 1328 recognized Scotland's independence, ending the 30 years of Wars of Independence. Ed-ward agreed to the marriage of Robert Bruce's son David to his younger sister Joan daughter of Edward II. Robert Bruce died at his house in Cardross a year later of a serious illness described by some as leprosy.

ROMANCING THE STONE CURLING'S SCOTTISH HERITAGE

Who could have thought that a sport whose humble beginnings can be traced back five centuries to a frozen Scottish loch, would become one of the biggest hits at the 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics. At almost 500 years old, Curling is one of the oldest official sports of the Winter Games, and is also yet another glorious creation that can be added to the list of great Scottish inventions.

Over the years curling seems to have gone from the quirky cult hit of the games, to a sport that viewers are now legitimately watching in their droves. It's also interesting to note that all of the 2014 Women Great Britain Olympic curlers are Scottish, and with the exception of one, are aged in their twenties. Likewise for the Men's team, all are Scottish.

The Women's team went on to win a Bronze medal. Sweden took the Silver and Canada the Gold. For the men – Gold – Canada, Silver – Great Britain, Bronze – Sweden.

Nicknamed 'chess on ice', for centuries curling has been a favorite game in Scotland. In fact,

during the first two thirds of the nineteenth century it can be said that it was the Scottish game, before the mighty football began to dominate. Evidence of curling's early days first start to appear around the beginning of



the 16th century, when what is thought to be the earliest known curling stone was found when and old pond was drained just outside of Dunblane, inscribed 'Stirling, 1511'. The first written account of curling was in 1541, when the notary John McQuhin recorded in his protocol book a challenge between John Sclater, a monk in Abbey Gavin Hamilton, Paisley and representative of the Abbot. The report indicated that Sclater threw a stone along the ice three times and asserted that he was ready for the agreed contest.

Over the coming centuries curling became one of the most popular amusements during the long Scottish winters. Kilsyth Curling Club in North Lanarkshire claims to be the first club in the world, having been formally constituted in 1716. (And yes, it's still around to this day).

Curling was even a popular topic in poetry – although there was no evidence that Rabbie Burns was a curler, he certainly knew all about it, as these two stanzas from his Tam Samson's Elegy clearly demonstrate: When Winter muffles up his cloak, And binds the mire like a rock; When to the loughs the curlers flock, Wi' gleesome speed, Wha will they station at the cock, Tam Samson's dead? He was the king of a' the Core. To guard, or draw, or wick a bore, Or up the rink like Jehu roar In time o' need; But now he lags on Death's hog-score, Tam Samson's dead.

(The "cock" was the "tee", to "wick abore" was to wick through a port; the other technical terms are still intelligible to curlers wherever the game is played.)



By the mid 19th century, the popularity of the game had exploded, and demand rose for a governing body. Founded in 1838, the Grand Caledonian Curling Club's purpose was to regulate "the ancient Scottish game of Curling by general laws". The club obtained royal patronage in 1842, and since then has been known as the Royal Caledonian Curling Club. As Scots immigrated throughout the 18th and 19th century, they took curling with them to all (cold) corners of the world. Today curling is mostly played in Canada, introduced by Scottish migrants in the 19th century.

In the last decades of the nineteenth century every county in Scotland had at least one club affiliated with the Royal Club, and almost every parish in the land had its custom-made curling pond. Originally curlers played on natural lochs and specially constructed ponds. However some seasons were barren when the winters were too mild. In 1907 the first indoor rink was built in Glasgow, with others popping up shortly after in Edinburgh and Aberdeen.

While the game soon after experienced a decline in popularity, interest in curling is well and truly on the increase – today there are at least 26 purpose-built rinks in Scotland for the game.

Latin name: Lysichiton Americanus

Habitat: Muddy pond margins and stream sides

Also called Western SKUNK CABBAGE or yellow S.C. or (my personal favourite) Swamp lantern

Plant omits strong odour like that of a skunk

Introduced 1901 to UK, Surrey

No adverse impacts on Health

As this plants outcompetes other native wetland plants I spray it twice a year, if possible, to eradicate it.

To all intents it is an attractive looking plant but then so is giant Hogweed.

There is a large specimen in the wild garden of the NTS gardens but the gardeners keep a close eye on it to avoid spreading.


BISHOP BURNETT ON EDUCATION

His governour had also to look well to himselfe.; for in this age youths are most prying and censorious, and will discerne one's weaknes; and finding any are apt because of it to contemne them, and disregard what they say.

As for their learning, they should be made still to continue in the practice of the tongues they have acquired, and for further improvement should get a general touch of most things.

I should begin with anatomy, as ane easy and useful piece of knowledge, not troubling the youth to get by heart the names of the veins, arteries,

nerves, and muscules, but to make him understand the use, function, situation and figure, and dependence of the chieff parts of the body; and this will be neither a tedious nor ane unpleasant work; especially if wee be where wee may see dissections. Yet good copper prints will compense in a



good degree this want, if the youths have a nimble fancy.

Next I would teach him the nature of herbs and trees, with the waies of cultivating and nursing them; and as this seems to have been intended by God for Adam his first task, so it is an eexercise so full of pleasure, that I know whether to call it a study or a recreation.

EASTER EGG ROCKY ROAD



Ingredients:

100g unsalted butter, softened
225g dark chocolate, broken into small pieces
2 tbsp golden syrup
2 tbsp cocoa powder
200g Mini Eggs
50g mini marshmallows
100g sultanas
100g Rich Tea biscuits, broken into small pieces

Method:

- 1. In a bowl over hot water, melt the chocolate and butter together
- 2. Then add cocoa powder and the golden syrup.
- 3. Mix together thoroughly. Then leave until fully cool.
- 4. Break the biscuits into smaller pieces and add to the chocolate mix.
- 5. Next, add the marshmallows and the mini eggs and stir until everything is covered in chocolate.
- 6. Pour into a tin lined with greaseproof paper and pat it down with a spoon until even.
- 7. Leave to set in the fridge for a minimum of 2 hours then cut into squares then ENJOY!!!

EASTER CHOCOLATE CUPCAKES



Ingredients:

For the cupcakes

115g Butter (unsalted)

115g Unrefined golden caster sugar2 Large Free Range Eggs115g Self-raising white flour1tsp Cocoa powder

¹/₂tsp Baking powder

For the buttercream 85g Butter (unsalted) softened 2tbsp Milk (whole) 1tbsp Cocoa powder heaped 225g Icing sugar

Mini chocolate eggs for decoration

- 1. Preheat the oven 190°C (170°C fan, gas mark 5).
- 2. Line a muffin tin with 12-14 cases.
- 3. Mix together the cocoa powder, flour and baking powder and sift.
- 4. Place all the ingredients together in a mixing bowl and beat together with a wooden spoon until well mixed. Spoon the mixture into the cases.
- 5. Bake the cupcakes on the middle shelf of your oven for 15 ~ 20 minutes, until the cupcakes are cooked throughout and spring to touch. Cool on a wire tray.
- 6. For the chocolate buttercream, place all ingredients in a mixing bowl and beat until smooth. Either spread or pipe over the cakes creating a nest effect and decorate with Easter eggs.

HERALDRY WITH CHARLES J BURNETT QUEEN'S HERALD IN SCOTLAND

If we were moving towards the Festive Season which includes Hogmanay, we would use the national drink to toast family and friends, it is appropriate to consider how heraldry has become involved with whisky!

The Counties of Banff and Moray have helped to create Scotland's greatest export – whisky. I have been told the whisky industry has raised more revenue for the government than ever provided by North Sea oil! Although several of our distilleries are now owned by foreign companies there are still some which are in family hands and some which have recorded Arms to place on their whisky bottle labels. This month I feature the whisky heraldry of Scotland which is so extensive that it is necessary to cover the subject over two editions of *Knock News*.

In times gone by wealthy landowners had wine bottles made with a stamped version of their Arms on the bottle. In France aristocratic vineyard owners would identify their wines with a paper label on the bottle featuring their personal coat of arms. If the wine was of good quality the aristocratic label then gave an indication of excellence, coupled with heritage, and a long tradition of providing a wine which stood the test of time. In due course a similar set of circumstances occurred in Scotland, once whisky became a fashionable drink in the latter part of the nineteenth century.



This is not the place to give a history of the whisky industry in Scotland, other authors are more competent than I, suffice it to say whisky developed from a heather-hill brew to a multi-million pound symbol of Scottish business acumen and identity. The tradition of Scottishness inevitably led to whisky bottles being identified with Scottish heraldry just as had happened with the wine industry in France and throughout the rest of Europe.




The Glenforres Glenlivet Distillery Company Limited, owned by William Grant & Sons Limited, first recorded these Arms in February 1936. However only three months later the company recorded new Arms under the name of William Grant & Sons Limited which were much more traditional in appearance and based on the normal charges associated with the surname of Grant, namely three ancient gold crowns.



The Arms are shown here, differenced by a fess charged with three red roses and supported by two wild men – common figures in Scottish heraldry. The Arms can be seen on whisky bottle labels to advertise the Water of Life within....

It is appropriate that it was a Speyside company who pioneered the use of heraldry to identify their products.

The second organisation to petition for Arms waited until the end of the Second World War. This was the Perth-based company of Arthur Bell & Sons Limited which was granted punning Arms based on the surname. Initially a gold bell was displayed on a green shield, but forty-two years later the company returned to the Lord Lyon and asked for the bell to be placed on a red and gold field and the Latin motto was placed above the sun crest. It means "Now and Ever".



Robert McNish & Company Limited, based in Glasgow, distilled and distributed whisky. The company was granted Arms in 1945 and the shield includes as a charge a Dutch 17th century "dimple" bottle which was very easy to carry in the hand! The salmon supporters are very much associated with Glasgow and the legend of the city's patron saint, St Mungo, who saved the King of Strathclyde's daughter by suggesting fishing for a salmon which, when caught, was found to have swallowed the daughter's lost precious ring!

A whisky-based liqueur company recorded Arms in 1953. Based in Edinburgh, the Drambuie Liqueur Company Limited very cleverly marketed their product as being a secret recipe given by Bonnie Prince Charlie during the '45 Rising. The Arms, with galley, and a hand holding a cross, is very West Coast of Scotland in association. As mentioned before East and West Coast heraldry in Scotland can be distinguished by the choice of charges on the shield. The secret recipe was given to a branch of the Mackinnon family whose Arms formed the basis of the company Arms.





There is another whisky-based liqueur produced in Scotland which is lighter in taste than Drambuie. This is made by Glayva Liqueur Limited which was established in 1965 and has its head office in Leith.

The Arms indicate the ingredients of the drink – barley, water, coriander and honey from the bee. The crest shows the link with Leith

and Scotland, the stylised ship flying St Andrew Crosses. The sail also carries an ear of barley.

In 1972 a group of older distilleries were brought together to form The Glenlivet Distillers Limited, based in Edinburgh. Two years later the company petitioned the Lord Lyon for a grant of arms and he created this device consisting of ears of barley in the form of a saltire with a boar's head and warlike accoutrements – a cannon and two targes. This reflected the history of the Glenlivet area which belonged to the Gordons [boar's head], and where the Battle of Glenlivet was fought in 1594.




This was the product of Joseph Burnett, of Boston. Burnett started selling the product in 1856. According to the product label, Cocoaine was entered according to an act of congress in 1857. When the Trademark was registered in 1927, they claimed to have been using the brand name since 1847. I think that is extremely unlikely, since Burnett brought his preparations to an Exposition in 1850 and the Cocoaine was not listed.

A couple of years after the product was introduced it was imitated by Phalon & Son's product: Cocoine. An ad in the 1860-61 Boston City Directory told about how Burnett had won an injunction against the Proprietors of Cocoine for trademark infringement. Apparently, this case was like a landmark case for the law regarding trademark infringement. The Phalons had to change the name of their product.

Burnett's Cocoaine sold for over 45 years and was one of the most successful hair preparations of the 19th century. Burnett's Cocoaine was still listed for sale in the 1901 Morrison & Plummer catalogue.
