FLOWERS OF THE FOREST

At the instigation of the ambitious young brother of King of the Scots, Henry VIII led an army against Scotland. King James IV and the "flowers" of Scottish nobility were brutally slain at the Battle of Flodden on September 9, 1513, one of the greatest disasters to befall the country.

The pipe tune "Flowers of the Forest" was a soulful lament written shortly after the battle took place. The "forest" refers to a district of Scotland called Ettrick Forest where the battle took place. Following in this tradition Herbert L Burnett and John A. Burnett who died in the summer of 2016, names will be entered into the roll, of the Flowers of the Forest at the Wisconsin Scottish Games during the Kirking of the Tartan Ceremony on Sunday September 4th, 2016.

Herbert was born on November 22, 1943, in Somerset, son of the late James and Luticia Calia Burnett. He was a veteran of the U.S. Navy. Herbert was an employee of Somerset Wood products. He loved gardening and watching U.K. basketball. Herbert was of Baptist faith.

REMEMBERING THOMAS E BURNETT JR HERO IN THE WAR ON TERRORISM

This September 11 marked the fifteen anniversary of the terrorist attacks in New York, Washington D.C., and Pennsylvania, and the fourth anniversary of the Americans lost at the consulate in Benghazi, Libya.

We as Burnetts had a hero on United flight 93 that crashed in a field outside Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

On September 11th, 2001 Tom Burnett Jr. became the first undrafted citizen soldier of flight United 93 in



the war against terrorism. Thomas E. Burnett, Jr., 38, had spent most of his last six weeks traveling in his role as Chief Operating Officer of Thoratec, a manufacturer of heart pumps for patients awaiting

transplants. The Minnesota native was a graduate of the University of Minnesota and Pepperdine University. On September 11, Burnett was returning home to San Ramon, California where his wife, Deena, and three daughters, Madison, Halley, and Anna Clare, were waiting. Tom's four phone calls to Deena from on board hijacked Flight 93 provided vital information to the passengers and crew and revealed the plans they were making to take back the plane. Deena recalls Tom saying, "We have to do something. We can't wait for the authorities It's up to us. I think we can do it."

Tom Burnett's family instituted a foundation to honor his memory and to "Do Something". The Tom Burnett Family Foundation was established to honor his life by being dedicated to the youth of the U.S. From special camps to counsel children who have lost a loved one, to leadership scholarships and programs to educate young people to be good citizens and the leaders of tomorrow.

There are numerous plaques, flag poles, and streets named in Tom Burnett's memory, mostly in Minnesota, where he grew up, and Northern California, near San Ramon, where he lived and worked.

The Centinela Adobe, California Home of Robert Burnett, 11th Baronet of Leys

Last summer I called and made an appointment with the curator of the Centinela Adobe in Westchester, outside Los Angles to visit the Centinela Adobe and learn more about the home of Sir Robert Burnett. As I followed the directions to the Adobe I thought that they must be wrong. There were neat, small homes along Midland Avenue, close together as they often are in Southern California neighborhoods. Then suddenly, mid-block, there appeared iron gates with a small white ranch-style house set much further back off the street. The sign said The Centinela Adobe.



The exterior of the small home still looks much like it did when Robert Burnett and later, his bride, Matilda Murphy Burnett, a native of New York, took residence in 1860.



Sir Robert left Scotland and was touring

Southern California in the late 1850's. He was enchanted by the area around the Adobe and decided to live there, purchasing the Adobe in 1860 for \$3,000 dollars from Joseph Lancaster Brent who left to fight for the South during the Civil War. However, Brent did not build the adobe.

Early History


In 1822, after the Mexican War of Independ-

ence brought freedom for Mexico from Spain, Antonio Ygnacio Avila received a Mexican land grant for Rancho

Sausal Redondo in Alta California, where he grazed cattle. The rancho's lands encompass the present day cities of Redondo Beach, Inglewood, Hawthorne, El Segundo, Lawndale, Manhattan Beach, and Hermosa Beach.

In the early 1830s, Ygnacio Machado, one of the "leather jacket soldiers" who escorted the original settlers of Los Angeles, began cultivating a portion of the rancho. Ygnacio Machado's brother Augustin Machado owned the

nearby 14,000-acre (57 km2) Rancho La Ballona, as well as the Rancho La Laguna and Rancho Santa Rosa.

Aguaje de la Centinela and built the 'Centinela Adobe' in 1834. Ygnacio Machado owned Rancho Aguaje de la Centinela only briefly, trading it in 1844 for a keg of whiskey and a small home in the Pueblo de Los Angeles.

Sir Robert Burnett and Improvements to the Centinela Adobe

Robert Burnett added land to the ranch, acquiring old Rancho Sausal Redondo for \$29,500. By 1872, Burnett had a 25,000-acre (100 km2) ranch that encompassed all of the land from what is now known as Playa del Rey to Lawndale and Redondo Beach. To the adobe itself Sir Robert Burnett

added a wood shake roof and a wooden floor to cover the dirt floor. He also added a kitchen, since the Spanish custom was to have the kitchen in a separate building, and pantry with a skylight. After these improvements were made Matilda arrived form New York .

A second floor was also added by Robert Burnett which no longer exists. He con-





structed a windmill and cultivated vegetables and grapes. The Rancho Sausal Redondo land was used to raise sheep. His flock grew to an overwhelming 24,000 head.



The Burnetts were societal leaders and entertained many important personalities at the adobe.

After the death of Robert's father, Sir James Horn Burnett, Robert and Matilda returned to Crathes having lived in the Centinela Adobe for thirteen years. Robert succeeded his father becoming the 11th Bar-



onet of Leys in 1876. Robert was appointed as a Justice of the Peace for Kincardineshire and lived in London. Robert died at age 60 in January 1894 at Crossburn House, East Wemyss, Fife. He was buried at Banchory Ternan Churchyard.

Robert and Matilda had one son, James Lauderdale Burnett who died in infancy. Robert was succeeded by his half-brother Thomas Burnett, who became the 12th Baronet of Leys. [See: Eileen Bailey, "The Holly and the Horn", page 62. This contradicts the U.S. accounts that have Robert succeeding a brother. Robert only had a half-brother, Colonel Sir Thomas Burnett who did become the 12th Baronet upon Robert's death.] Colonel Sir Thomas Burnett is the great grandfather of our Chief, James C A Burnett.

Daniel Freeman

In 1873, Burnett returned to Scotland, leasing the ranch to Daniel

Freeman, a recent arrival from Simcoe, Ontario, Canada. Freeman paid \$7,500 per year in rent, and also had an option to purchase the ranch for \$150,000. Freeman raised sheep and planted more than 10,000 trees, including 7,000 orange and 2,000 almond trees on the ranch. When a drought led to the death of 22,000 head of his sheep, Freeman turned to growing barley, and he eventually was producing a million barrels a year. In 1885, Freeman exercised the option to buy the ranch for \$140,000 in gold. Freeman amassed a fortune farming barley, olives, lemons, limes, and almonds on the ranch and named his expansive land holding Ingle wood, after his birthplace in Ontario. In 1887, the California Central Railway laid tracks to Redondo Beach, and Freeman sold off 11,000 acres (45 km2) in small parcels as a settlement that became the city of Inglewood.

In 1888, Freeman built a large mansion in Inglewood, and in 1889. he built the land office that now sits on the grounds of the Centinela Adobe. Eventually, all 25,000 acres (100 km2) of the ranch were subdivided, and the only remaining portion of the ranch that remains is the 1acre (4,000 m2) site on which the Centinela Adobe is situated.



Preservation of the Adobe

The CentinelaAdobe

Complex has been described as the historical centerpiece of the area known as Centinela Valley, the lands extending from the Baldwin Hills to Palos Verdes, which comprised the Centinela Ranch. Yet, in the late 1940s, the adobe was threatened with demolition when the remaining land was subdivided to make room for new homes. Preservationminded citizens raised money to purchase the property in 1950 and deeded it to City of Inglewood, which still maintains the adobe through the Parks and Recreation Department. Even though the 1-acre (4,000 m2) site is located in the Westchester district of Los Angeles, Centinela Adobe played a central role in the history of Inglewood.

The adobe has been restored and is operated jointly by the Historical Society of the Centinela Valley and the Inglewood Department of Parks and Recreation. The adobe is furnished with period furniture and artifacts from the late 19th century.

In a 2001 profile of the museum in 2001, the Los Angeles Times wrote:

"The long, low, white stucco adobe with its porch and shingle roof looks as if it is sitting right in the middle of the 19th Century. But it's not, as the nearby San Diego Freeway visibly demonstrates. It's really a kind of time warp: the telltale sign of a modern metropolis on one side and the oldest home in the Centinela Valley on the other-still serene, still peaceful amid lawns, shrubs and shade trees"

(Gerald Faris (1988-01-15). "A kind of time warp: oldest home in the Centinela Valley on one side and telltale sign of a modern metropolis on the other". Los Angeles Times) I can attest that an off-ramp of the 405 freeway runs dangerously close to the backyard of the adobe.

In Freeman's office there is a small display of a Burnett shield shaped plaque with a background of Burnett Ancient Tartan. I sent the curator a strip of Burnett Dress Tartan to add to the display. This year I will bring a strip of Burnett Hunting Tartan to add.

The House of Burnett has donated \$100.00 in 2015 for the preservation of the Centinela Adobe. An agenda item at this year's board meeting will be a yearly contribution to the Centinela Adobe to keep it for future Burnetts, as well as future Southern Californians.



The adobe and museum are

located at **7634 Midfield Ave, Westchester, Los Angeles, California.,** a residential street abutting the 405 Freeway. It is **open on Sundays from 2 to 4 p.m**. Admission is free, and docents, (tour guides) are available to provide tours. The adobe can be toured for groups or special occasions at other times by calling the Historical Society. RICHARD BURNETT. BEAUMARIS

Vinny Burnett's parents, Christopher and Margie Cox,

were recently visiting friends in Anglesey and attended service in St Mary & St Nicholas Church, Beaumaris. They noticed а stone plaque on the south wall as shown, and "In inscribed memory of Richard Burnett, gentleman, who departed this life on June 8th 1746 in the 66th year of



his age". His age at death suggests he was born about 1681.

Eileen Bailey did a bit of research. There was an Elizabeth Goodman, (of a Goodman family who seem to have been prominent in Beaumaris), who married a Richard Burnett there in 1675. They could be the

parents of Richard Burnett born 1681 but she has not yet found a birth/baptism to confirm this. Eileen also found a reference on the internet to a publication "An Inventory of the Ancient Monuments of Anglesey" which mentioned "Richard Burnett 1746 with shield of arms(argent)three holly leaves in chief(vert) and a hunting horn in base(sable)".

If any reader can throw light on the above and the origins of Richard Burnett, I would be pleased to receive any relevant information

SLAINS PURSUIVANT

Visitors to the Aboyne and doubtless other Highland Games, will have been impressed with the presence of the person in the centre of this photograph. He is a member of our good friends, Clan Hay. He is the Slains Pursuivant who is the appointment of Lord Errol and approved of by the Lord Lyon.

A pursuivant or, more correctly, pursuivant of arms, is a junior officer of arms. Most pursuivants are attached to official heraldic authorities, such as the College of Arms in London or the Court of the Lord Lyon in Edinburgh. In the mediaeval era, many great nobles employed their own officers of arms. Today, there still exist some private pursuivants who are not employed by a government authority. In Scotland, for example, several pursuivants of arms have been appointed by Clan Chiefs as is the case here. These pursuivants of arms look after matters of heraldic and genealogical importance for clan members. A more public role is to carry the Banner and parade in smart uniform at events.

A TIMELESS GIFT TO THE AQUARIUM

On a warm summer day, Retired Chief District Court Judge Gilbert Burnett found himself in a flowering butterfly garden at the North Carolina Aquarium at Fort Fisher. He stood next to a six-foot, spherical sundial and beamed at three generations of his family. With a scholar's knowledge of history, a gentleman's understanding of longevity and a storyteller's love of details, he talked about time and timing.



Burnett reminisced about how his grandfather once owned the land where the aquarium now stands and pastured cattle in the sandy scrub. Burnett shared his interest in the origins of timekeeping based on the sun. He expressed his love for family and an idea to create a memorial for when his time passed. He acknowledged the artistry and skill of local metal sculptor Dumay Gorham. And he spoke humbly of how all these pieces came together in this moment and left him, "Speechless...almost."

What he didn't say was how his generosity and vision helped create an educational tool and functional piece of art which will stand the test of time.

"Gil's generous donation to the Aquarium and his love of sundials has created a living legacy," said Aquarium Director Peggy Sloan. "Not only is this a gift to his family, it also enriches the experience of hundreds of thousands of Aquarium visitors each year."

Interpretation panels near the bronze sundial educate visitors on the evolution of telling time



blution of telling time before watches and cell phones and how

to accurately use the multi-dimensional sculpture in relation to the sun's position

in the sky. In addition, the sundial base is emblazoned with lasting words of wisdom selected by Burnett, including the Rolling Stones lyric, "Time waits for no one."

BURNETTS WITH LINKS TO POLAND

Particularly in the 1500s and 1600s there was a strong trade between Scotland and Europe, particularly the Low Countries and France. Aberdeen was one of the main Scottish ports.

Several Burnetts (at that time mainly spelt Burnet) from the Burnett of Leys family were prominent merchants in Aberdeen and involved in trade with Europe. One line, the Burnetts of Camphill (part of the Leys estate), had several individuals who were merchants trading with and/or in Poland.

Alexander Burnet, who was a Burgess and Merchant of Aberdeen, was a Burgess in Cracow before 1592. His brother Robert Burnet was a traveller in Poland in 1597.

Later a James Burnet was described as a "Merchant in Danseik" in a document dated 1652 detailing his ancestry and he was later styled as " of Danzig". His brother Andrew Burnet served in the Polish Army with Captain(later General) Patrick Gordon from Aberdeenshire. In 1661 he joined the Russian service with the rank of Lieutenant and reached the rank of Captain in 1678 when he took part in the Chigirin Campaign.

From another branch, the Burnetts of Kirkhill, Alexander Burnett, 1st Laird of Kirkhill, baptised 1620, was a Baillie in Aberdeen and carried the designation "Polls" or "Poles", a term used to identify that he had strong trading links with Poland.

No research has yet been done to establish if any of the above-mentioned Burnets/Burnetts had any descendants in Poland.



CHARLES BURNETT

I had a visit recently from Charles Burnett, the Ross Herald, his wife Aileen and their eldest grand-daughter Ellie. Many readers will know Charles from their times at Crathes and from his visit to Las Vegas in 2015. Ellie very kindly gave me two pieces of Burnett



heraldic miniature porcelain which I will be displaying in the family room before next season. One is a small Gemma porcelain bowl showing the Burnett of Kemnay Arms and the other a caldron, made in England displaying our own achievement. These will form part of the display.

I never fail to be much the wiser from meeting Charles and many others have similarly benefitted. I noted down three little pieces of information which may be of interest to visitors to the Castle.

A Heraldic Achievement is essentially a Coat of Arms supported on either side by two human or animal figures. As I am descended from somebody who was a commissioner of the Scottish Parliament (a Member of Parliament today), in 1592 I am entitled to Supporters in my achievement. Moreover, in 1592, there was an Act giving the Lord Lyon powers over heraldry which could end up with the offender now being fined up £100 per day or imprisoned. The Act has never been repealed!

In the Green Lady's room on the fireback are the Royal Arms of France surrounded by the Collar of the

French Order of St Michael. The Scots called this "The Order of the Cockle" because of the cockle shells which are depicted in the collar. The French Royal Arms disappeared at the time of the French Revolution, SO presumably the Crathes fireback is a modern reproduction. or а genuine fireback dating



from the 17th century. Presumably a Burnett ancestor purchased the fireback on a "Grand Tour" visit to France before the Revolution.

In the Muses Room there is a Chancellors Purse



which is handed to each holder of the office. I wrote a short article on this in the Banner of June 2012. The Scottish one (stopped in 1707) and the last one is in the Royal Ontario Museum, Toronto. It bears the Arms used by King William & Queen Mary.
