

California (in the Central Valley). He did missionary service for 2 years in Siberia, after high school, becoming fluent in Russian. He Graduated from Utah State University with a BA in Political Science in 2003 and from the University of Utah with an MA in Political Science in 2007.

He caddied on the Nationwide Tour for several events for Boyd Summerhays and graduated from Claremont Graduate University with a PhD in Political Science in 2013.

FLOWERS OF THE FOREST Bridget Burnett November 12th 1928 – October 8th 2016

I was very sorry to hear from Mark Palumbo of the

death, at the Genesis Elder Care Mountain View Center in Rutland, of his mother Bridget Burnett following a long illness. We very much enjoyed the company of Bridget and two of sons, Mark and Malcolm at the 2000 Gathering and they have made much appreciated contributions to the family room at Crathes.



Bridget was born in Edinburgh and was the daughter of Thomas Leslie Forbes and Eve Diane Burnett who was a Burnett of Kemnay. She was enrolled in the Convent of Sacred Hearts at Roehampton and went to live in 1945 after the war in America married Michael John Palumbo.



Bridget had six sons and spent much of her life helping many in Africa to overcome hunger and poverty. Followers of the Banner will recall an account of her wonderful work in Banner 11 in 2010. I think that the picture of Bridget amongst the children in Kenya in 2010 says it all. She loved to travel and enjoyed gardening, antique collecting and raising Scottish deer hounds. She leaves behind six sons and four grandchildren. Bridget's passing is a great loss to many of us.

John Cameron Burnett 1953- 2016

John was raised on a farm just north of Atkins and

later graduated from the University of Arkansas School of Law. He served in several roles for his community and most recently as a Public Defender for Johnson County. He also previously served as Atkins City Judge, Chairman of the Benton County



Election Commission and on the Quorum court, as well being as an Arkansas delegate to the 1984 Democratic National Convention

As Jim went on to say so aptly, Johnny was larger than life and had the personality to go with it. He was a proud Yellow Dog Democrat and never missed an opportunity to antagonize Republicans. Johnny's uncommon empathy, desire for justice, and relentless pursuit to better the lives of those around him won him admiration, respect, and love from all those he encountered. I was honoured to be allowed to send a brief message for the service and which included the following

I hope that John understood the appreciation that the Burnetts at Crathes had for him and the admiration with which we held him. The House of Burnett developed as an amalgamation of the Burnett Society, which was founded by Mary Dunklee, and Clan Burnett Inc. and John was the major player in formalising the successful Society which we have today. The existence of such a Society is as important for Burnetts in Scotland as it is for those overseas. It is an essential part of the promotion of the name of Burnett and establishing links with Burnetts around the world and for this we owe John much gratitude. Not least, we should thank him for the magnificent Great Burnett Heraldic Poster, The Arms of the Burnetts, which, after many years and a lot of work, he launched at the Gathering in Las Vegas last year.

I have many fond memories of John from staying with the family in Oklahoma to his stay with us at Crathes. I am grateful to him for his role as my Tosheador in the United States. I forgave him for arranging for us to attend the Grandfather Mountain Games, but not telling me that, in the absence of any Chiefs of larger clans, I was to be the Honoured Chief and had to address an attendance of about ten thousand Scots. I recall arranging to meet him for a drink after arriving at Dallas Fort Worth to discuss the programme for the Highland Games in Arlington where the House of Burnett were to have a strong presence. We did not appreciate that Arlington was in a dry county and the nearest place where we could find somewhere to sit down and have a chat with some refreshment was a Hooters restaurant. All part of the great experience for us Scots. John never failed to be great company and it is something that many will miss.

HOUSE OF BURNETT LIEUTENANTS

John Burnett acted as the Tosheador or my representative in the USA. Burnetts in the USA are fortunate inasmuch as the House of Burnett is an established society and both worked well together, but he role of the Tosheador might have been different if such an organisation had not existed.

There is no Burnett organisation which is similar to the House of Burnett. That includes Scotland and yet there are many Burnetts throughout the world who might like to benefit from the existence of a society. We have therefore decided to replace the title of Tosheador, which is maybe less than wholly appropriate for a lowland Clan, with that of Burnett Lieutenant and endeavour to expand the promotion of the name Burnett

The duties of the Burnett Lieutenants should be

- To represent the Chief of the Name at all public gatherings of the House of Burnett in their area.
- To welcome new Members of the House and to present them formally with Certificates of Membership.
- To disseminate information and decisions from the Chief of the Name to Members in their area.
- To act as a conduit for Members to contact the Chief of the Name with any problems, enquiries, or suggestions.

ATHLETICS



We are very pleased to provide support for two of the

finest young athletes in the United Kingdom. Kathryn Christie, whose grandfather was a tenant farmer on the Levs Estate, was unfortunately unable to take part in competition in 2015 and 2016 due to a medical condition with her both feet. However, she has undergone operations to correct this and



we are delighted that she will be back on the track for 2017.

Prior to this problem, Kathryn's Championship performances were impressive. In 2014, aged 19, she was the Scottish and Scottish Universities Indoor Champion at 60m as well as Scottish Indoor Champion at 200m. Outdoors, she was the Scottish and Scottish Universities Champion at 100m and 200m, setting a new Championship best in the Universities 200m. This Scottish Championship double was her second in three years.

On the UK stage in 2014, Kathryn won a Silver Medal in the England Under 23 Championships at 200m and also won the UK Inter County Championships at 200m. Only two other Scottish females have won a Sprint Title at the Inter Counties in the last 20 years, with the last being Lee McConnell in 2009.

Alisha Rees excelled in 2015, with the climax to her season being silver and bronze medals in the sprints at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Samoa.

She has enjoyed a very successful 2016, which is her first year as an Under 20. In Indoor competitions she ran within 0.02s of the all-time Best Performance for a Scottish Under 20 athlete over 200m, the time



having been set by Linsey Macdonald in 1982. In Outdoor Competitions, Alisha outstanding winning gave performances, including the Scottish Schools 100m; the 100m Celtic Games and 200m; and silver and bronze medals in the England Under 20 Championships. Amongst many other successes, she

won a Silver Medal in the 200m at the European Youth Athletics Championships in Tbilisi, Georgia. All this was during a demanding and satisfactory academic year at school. We look forward to 2017 with best wishes to Kathryn and Alisha

A BURNETT LEGEND

From Charles Burnett, Ross Herald

Charles Burnett had the good fortune to meet Fenton Wyness, a renowned architect and author who assisted with some restoration work in the Great Hall at Crathes. I also recall a visit from him but was too young at the time to appreciate whom I met. Fenton Wyness was responsible for Legends of the North East which included a story about the Loch of Leys and from which Charles Burnett has provided me with the following.

Fenton Wyness, 1903 – 1974, was a well-known Aberdeen architect, antiquarian and author. He published fourteen books, illustrating several in his own unique style. In 1970 he published a small paperback book for young people entitled *Legends of Northeast Scotland* which had a distinctive cover featuring the coat of arms of Aberdeen County Council. The shield has four quarters symbolising the four main area of Aberdeenshire; Buchan, Mar, the Garioch, and Gordon. The book contains twenty-four short stories, one of which concerns the Burnett family.

As a tribute to Fenton Wyness who was a personal friend of mine, here is the Burnett legend taken from his book with full acknowledgement to his memory.

THE PHANTOM OF THE LOCH

On a beautiful site on the north bank of the River Dee, not far from the village of Banchory, stands the ancient castle of Crathes. It is the ancestral home of the Burnetts of Leys, and is one of the most beautiful castles in Kincardineshire. Crathes Castle was built towards the end of the sixteenth century, but prior to this the Burnetts stayed at their stronghold on the Loch of Leys, a short distance north-west of the present castle. The Loch of Leys has long since been drained, but even today the site of the Burnetts' island home can still be seen.

In this stronghold lived Alexander Burnett, 8th laird of Leys. He married late in life, Agnes Lechtoun, a proud and ambitious woman who bore him a son also called Alexander. When the boy was about six years of age the laird died, so that the duties of the Barony fell to Lady Agnes. These duties suited her well, for she was a domineering woman who loved to exercise her power over others. One evening when Lady Agnes and the young laird, who was now nearly seventeen years of age, were sitting in the great hall of the castle a servant came running in to tell them that a nobleman and his retinue were calling for boats to bring them to the island. Lady Agnes and the young laird hastened to prepare for the arrival of the stranger, and in a short time Sir Roger de Bernard, from France, and his daughter Bertha were announced.

The de Bernards were related to the Burnetts through a cadet branch of the family which had settled abroad many generations before. Roger de Bernard had always longed to visit the ancestral home of the family, and as France was in a very unsettled state, he had taken the opportunity of bringing his daughter with him. Lady Agnes and the young laird welcomed their relatives, and to celebrate the occasion a great banquet was arranged for the following evening. The banquet was attended by many of the neighbouring lairds and their wives, and was a great success. After the feasting was over, Lady Agnes made a speech of welcome, which was replied to by Sir Roger. He thanked Lady Agnes and the young laird for their welcome, and said that he proposed to leave his daughter Bertha in the safe keeping of his kinsman while he returned to France to settle up his affairs, after which he would come back to Leys.

Alexander, the young laird, jumped to his feet and said he was honoured to be allowed to look after Bertha de Bernard, and his words were applauded by all. But one of the company did not relish the arrangement. This was Lady Agnes, for she had already noted the friendship that had sprung up between her son and Bertha. Lady Agnes had made other plans. She had decided that the laird of Leys should marry into the noble family of the Lords of Lorne, and she did not intend to let anyone upset her scheme. In a day or two Sir Roger de Bernard bade farewell to his daughter, and left for France. It was summer and Alexander, the young laird, and Bertha de Bernard spent most of their time in the saddle galloping over the hills and moors, and visiting friends and neighbours. Wherever they went they were popular, for their natural charm was a joy to see, and it was evident that they were deeply in love. Only the Lady Agnes disapproved. In autumn, Alexander was obliged to go south to see the Abbot of Arbroath about a land dispute. He was uncertain how long his business would take him, and Bertha dreaded his going. She knew only too well that Lady Agnes resented her friendship with her son, so after he left Bertha hardly ever came down from her room in the tower.

Winter came and there was no sign of Alexander returning to Leys. Bertha fell ill of some wasting disease, and by the time spring came round little hope was held out for her recovery. One day towards the end of June, Alexander returned home, but to his surprise there was no welcome awaiting him. Everything was quiet on the island and hurried to the great hall to find out what was wrong. Imagine his horror when, in the centre of the lofty room, he saw a bier on which lay his beloved Bertha. His mother, Lady Agnes, crossed the room to comfort him. His brain reeled, and he felt faint. Alexander reached for a cup of wine standing on a table nearby, but his mother snatched it from his grasp and dashed it out of the window into the loch. Not a word was spoken between them, but Alexander understood. Bertha de Bernard had been poisoned.

It was a bitter blow for the young laird, but with the passage of time the memory of Bertha passed from his mind, and life at the castle gradually returned to normal. About a year after Bertha's death, the family were sitting at supper in the hall. Suddenly the door swung open and into the room strode Sir Roger de Bernard. He had come back for his daughter. On his way over from France he had heard of her death and, as he stood at the end of the table, he accused Lady Agnes of killing her. A terrible scene followed, and Sir Roger called down curses upon Lady Agnes who, he said, had broken faith with him and cruelly killed his daughter to further her own ends.

A curious chill seemed to enter the room. The hangings on the walls moved as if by some sudden wind. Lady Agnes sat bolt upright in her chair. She seemed transfixed with horror. Slowly she rose to her feet and screamed "she comes, she comes!" – then with a horrible laugh sank to the floor dead.

When the awful memory of the tragedy was forgotten, Alexander Burnett, 9th laird of Leys, married Janet Hamilton, kinswoman to Archbishop Hamilton, and they were very happy together. Alexander decided that the old island castle of Leys would be better left to its tragic memories, so in 1533 he commenced to build the present Crathes Castle, but did not live to see it completed.

Once a year, it is said, at the witching hour of midnight, the ghostly figure of a woman rises from the site of the old castle of Leys and glides slowly over the hill of Banchory to Crathes Castle. Some say it is the wraith of Bertha de Bernard going to see the beautiful castle built by her lover, while others maintain that it is the shade of Lady Agnes forever earthbound on account of her terrible crime.

Comment: The illustration by Fenton Wyness shows the Loch of Leys with its wooden castle built on the Crannog. The crannog was an artificial man-made island of safety in the middle of the loch. Above are the Arms of Burnett of Leys balanced on the left by the Phantom in medieval dress.

A new book by Charles J Burnett Esq. former Ross



Herald and President Emeritus of the Heraldry Society of Scotland has been published by the Scottish Record Society.

The book is an expanded update on the *Court of the Lord Lyon 1318-1945* by Sir Francis Grant, published in 1946 by the Scottish Record Society. Since then further research has added

the names and numbers of Scottish Officers, and details of the individuals appointed since 1946 have been included. The book is profusely illustrated in colour and consists of eight sections including Acknowledgements, Introduction, Evolution of the Officer's Uniform, Location of Places associated with the Officers of Arms, List of Officers and Other Officials of Lyon Court, Biographies of Officers and Herald Painters, List of Illustrations with Sources, and a Bibliography.

Personal Career Details

After graduating from Gray's School of Art, Aberdeen and Aberdeen College of Education, he was employed in London at the Central Office of Information where he was a member of the design and management team for the British Pavilion at Expo 67 in Montreal, Canada.

He returned to Scotland in 1971 and was appointed head of design at the National Museum of Antiquities of Scotland in Edinburgh. In 1985 he transferred to the United Services Museum in Edinburgh Castle as curator of fine art, silver, and medals. While there he completed a part-time M Litt degree at Edinburgh University.

After eleven years working in the magical atmosphere of Edinburgh Castle, he was appointed Chamberlain of Duff House, Banff, an eighteenth century William Adam mansion filled with fine art and furniture. Apart from managing some thirty members of staff he was responsible for arranging an annual programme of temporary exhibitions, concerts, lectures, and other events. He retired from Duff House in 2004.


In 1983 he was appointed one of the Queen's Heralds in Scotland. This is an honorary position which involves ceremonial duties, giving advice, and lecturing on heraldry and related subjects. As a result he has travelled extensively and delivered over two hundred and ninety lectures; one outcome of speaking in the USA has been my becoming an honorary citizen of the State of Oklahoma!

Oral Traditions of the Burnett Family

A new found Burnett friend in Aberdeen has reminded me of the interesting small book, Legends of Leys, compiled or written by E.M.R. and to which I drew attention in Banner 15. When he first arrived in Aberdeen, he came across the book quite by chance in the Reference Section of the Aberdeen Central Library. Naturally intrigued, he was dismayed to discover that he couldn't borrow the book, and spent an hour or so photocopying the pages to peruse at his leisure. Sometime later, (maybe in the late 1980's), he had cause to examine the book again and discovered it was missing. He had hoped that it had been re-shelved for safekeeping in the library "overflow", but alas it was untraceable and he presumed stolen. Fortunately, there are reprints available and the content is available online.

Now he had always assumed E. M. R. to be of the "fairer" sex since it would be natural in 1856 for a woman to publish using initial. There then existed an Elizabeth Marjory Ramsay of Balmain who would have been 36 in 1856. Could this be the mystery scribe?

CHRISTMAS FUN!





Ingredients

Approx. 350g plain flour 1/4 teaspoon salt 15g fresh yeast or 1 1/2 teaspoons dried yeast 50g caster sugar 4 tablespoons warm water (or milk) 3 eggs or 6 egg yolks 1/4 teaspoon vanilla essence 2 teaspoons finely grated lemon rind 100g butter, softened 75g sultanas 40g candied lemon peel, chopped 25g butter, melted

<u>Method</u>

Dissolve the yeast in the warm water, with a teaspoon of the sugar and leave in a warm place to froth.

Beat the eggs with the vanilla essence and lemon rind ready for use later.

Cream the softened butter and sugar together until fluffy. Then gradually mix in the egg mixture.

Sift the flour and salt into a bowl. Gently add and mix in the milky/yeast and then the creamed butter/sugar mixture. Mix until you have a soft dough.

Mix the rest of the sugar into the flour.

Turn it on to a floured board and knead for about 10 minutes until smooth and silky. Put into a warm bowl, cover, and leave for about 45 minutes to 1 hour or until doubled in bulk.

Knock back the dough and knead in the sultanas and peel. Shape the dough into a ball, put into a greased and lined 18 cm / 7 inch round cake tin and cut a cross in the top. Leave in a warm place for about 15 to 20 minutes or until doubled in bulk.

Brush the top of the Panetone with melted butter and bake in the center of a preheated moderately hot oven at 200°C / 400°F / Gas Mark 6 for 10 minutes. Brush again with melted butter and reduce the heat to 180°'C / 350°F / Gas Mark 4 for a further 40 minutes or until the top is crisp and golden and a skewer inserted comes out clean. Cool on a wire tray. Serve cut into thick wedges.
